

Calcium silica speciation and carbonation in cement systems

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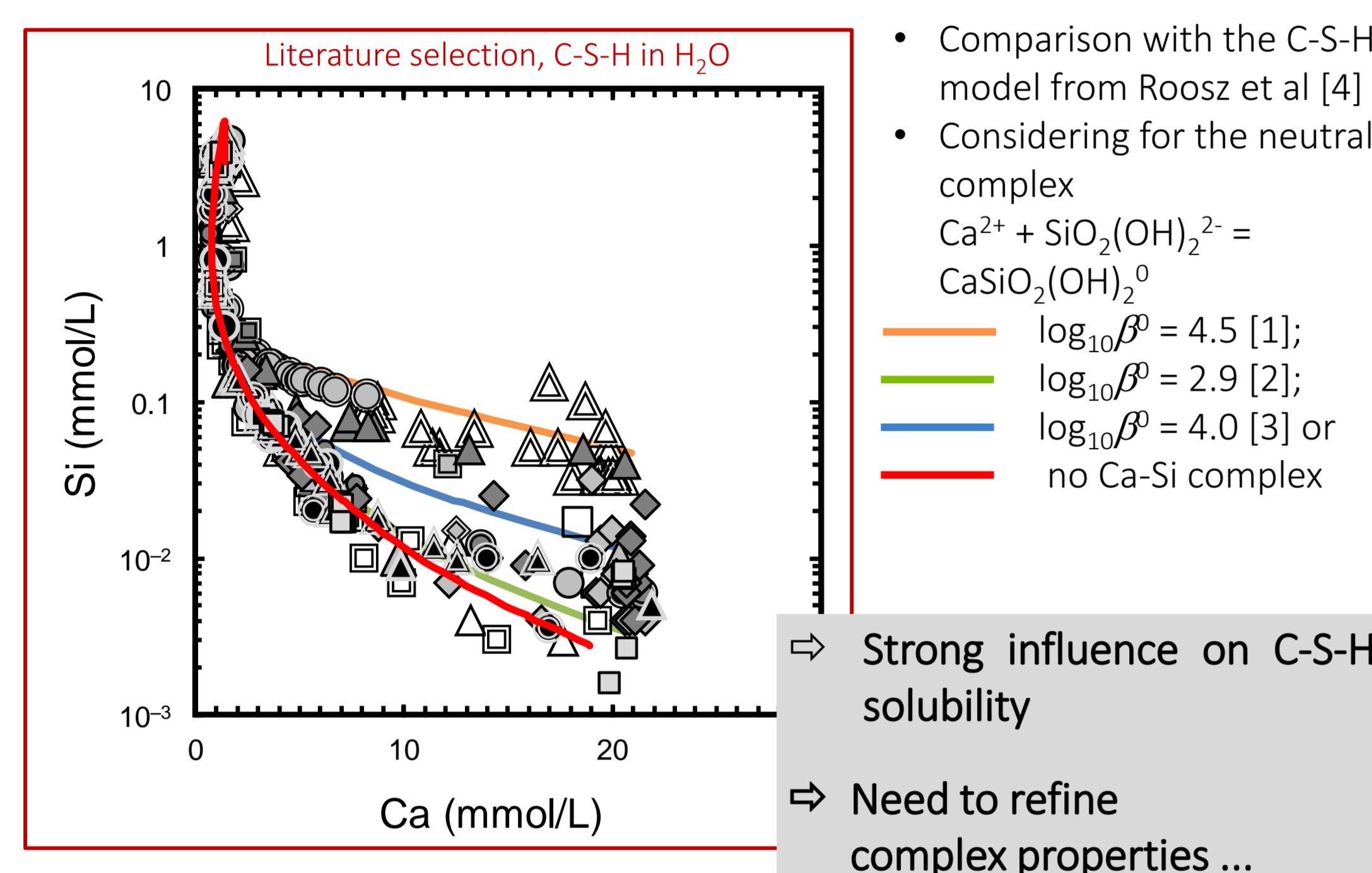
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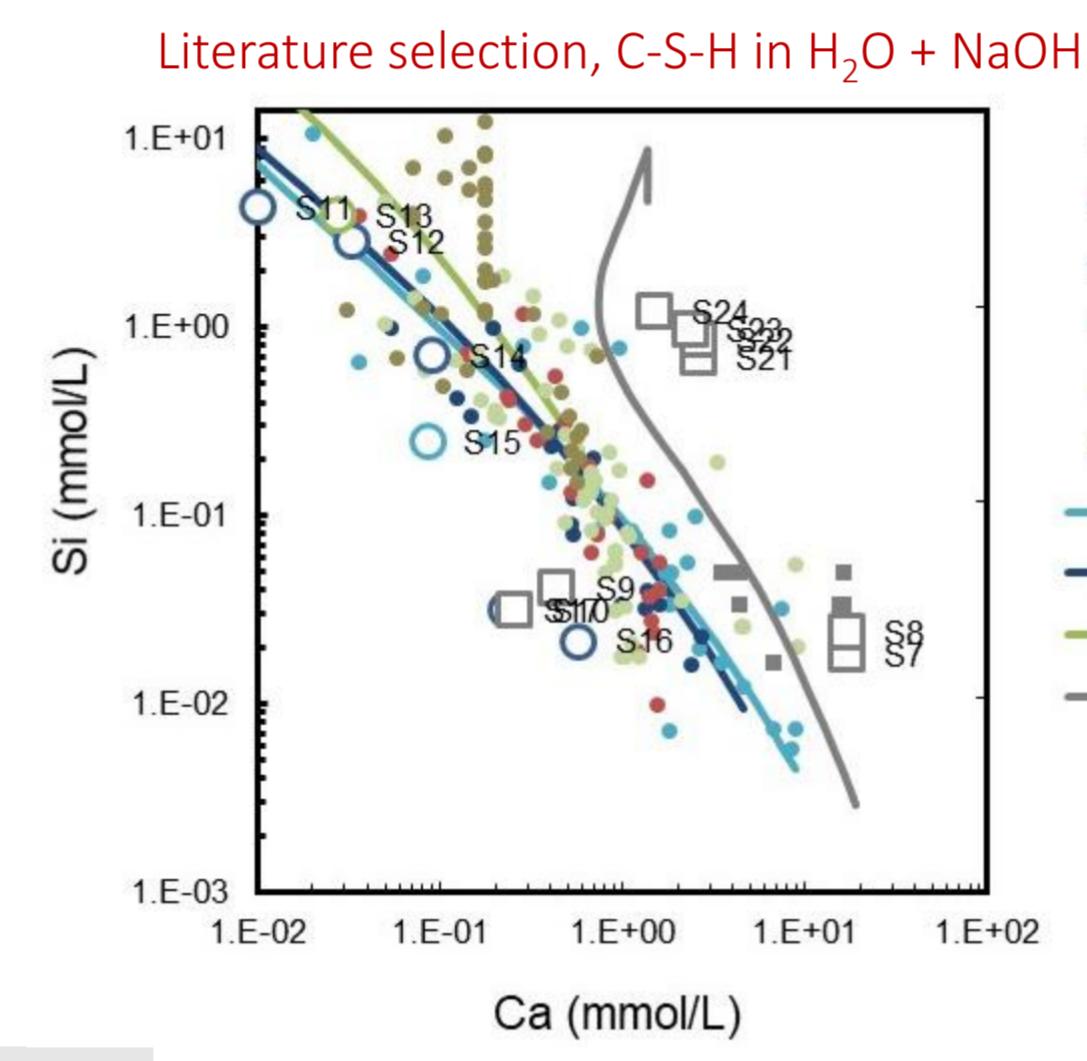
Deep disposal concepts for radioactive waste are usually based on a multiple barriers which may involve cementitious materials and thus alkaline media. In such regard, silica and calcium speciation is of major importance for geochemical calculations. The existence of mixed calcium-silica complexes ($\text{CaSiO}(\text{OH})_3^+$ and especially $\text{CaSiO}_2(\text{OH})_2$) was inferred in previous works [1, 2]. The present study proposes an assessment for the influence of such complexes on cement hydrates (C-S-H) solubility, with a specific focus on experiment conditions and carbonation, based on a set of lab experiments and measurements, including a short assessment of previous works.

Context



Synthesis of solutions

- Glovebox + NaOH traps
- Na_2SiO_3 solution (Merck®), SiO_2 (Aerosil®), NaOH 1M (Merck®), $\text{Ca}(\text{OH})_2$ (Merck®, heated at 1000°C 12h)
- Filtrated at 0.1 μm , ultra filtrated at 10kD, 3kD
- Mother solutions S1-S6 ; C-S-H solutions S7-S10 and S21-S24 ; N-C-S-H solutions S11-S17



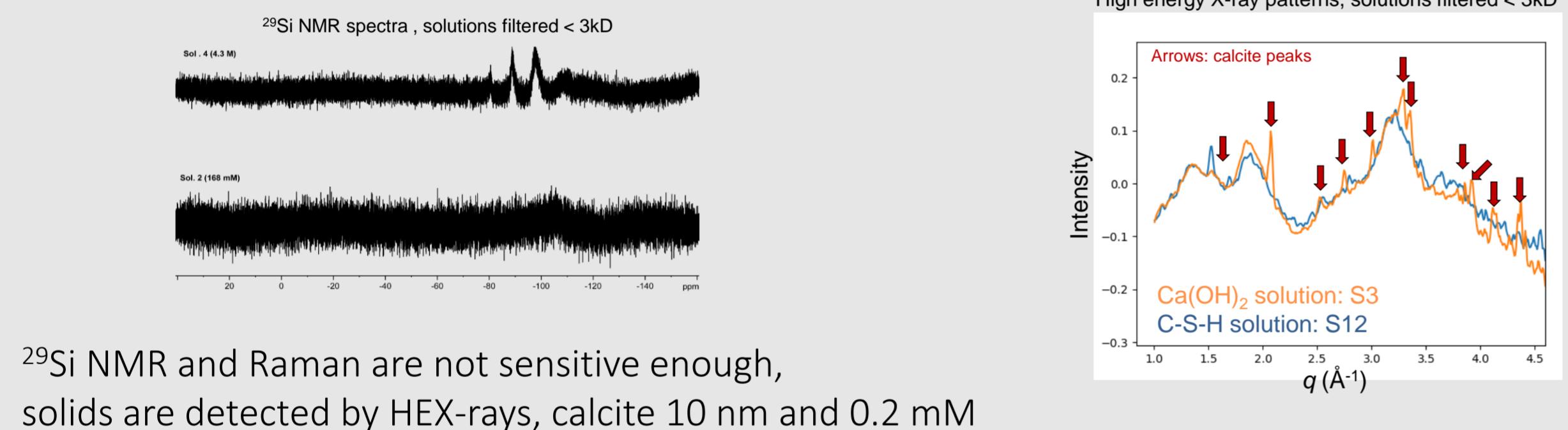
Solution analyses

- pH, T°C, Eh
- Dissolved Si, Ca, Na by ICP-MS and ICP-AES
- After 0.1 μm filtration, after 10 and 3 kD filtration
- Ca^{2+} ISE electrodes measurements

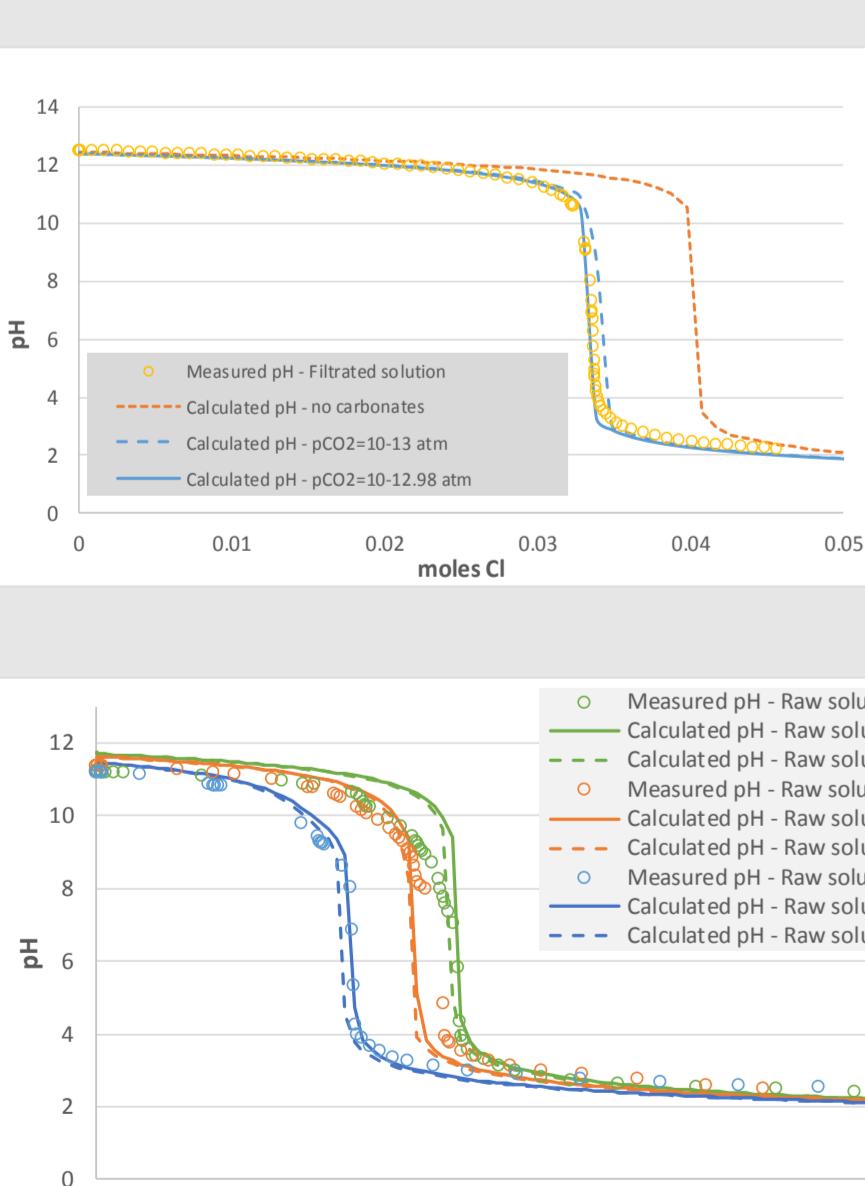
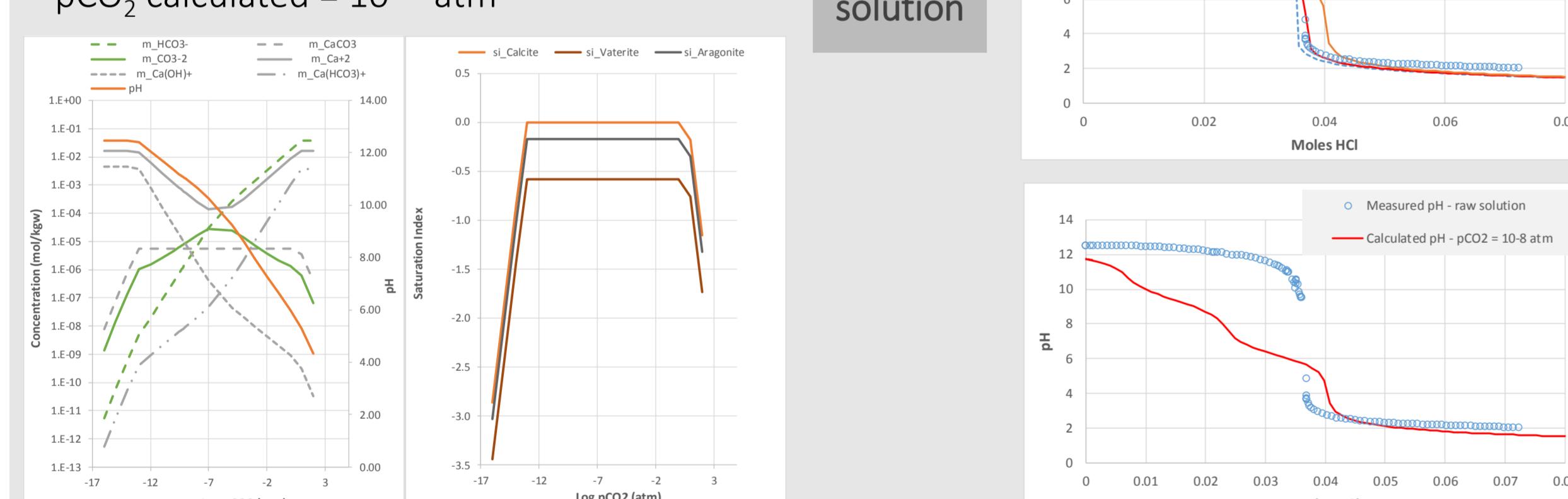

Titrations

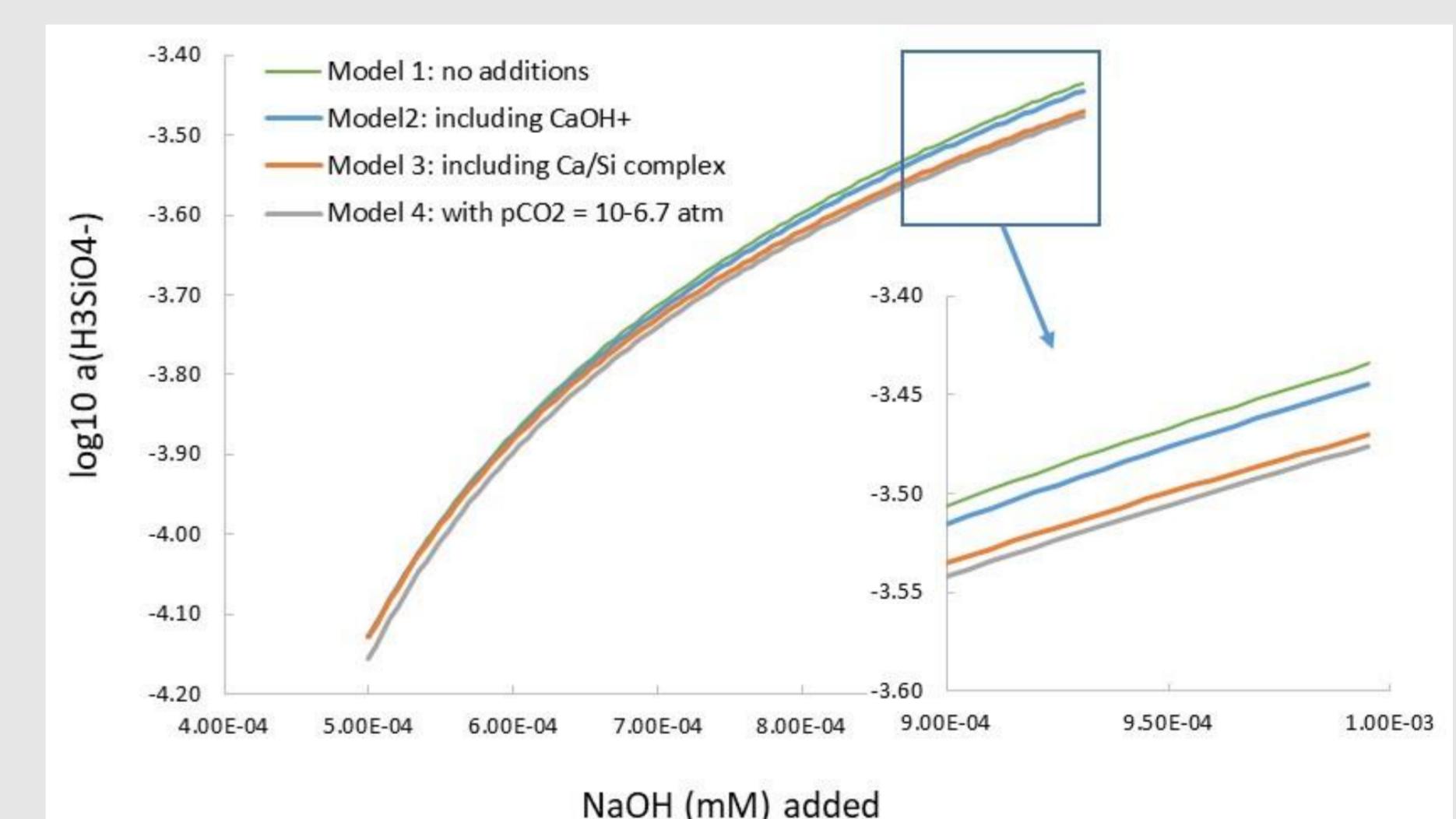
Calcite present after < 3 kD filtration, pCO_2 calculated = 10^{-13} atm



Santschi and Schindler [1]

- Titration in 1M NaClO_4
- $[\text{Si}] = 2.25$ mM, pH ranging from 8.3 to 8.9, $[\text{Ca}] = 150, 200$ and 250 mM
- preparation involves dissolved Na_2CO_3
- solids precipitate at the end of the experiment (pH = 8.9)
- no means reported to prevent carbonation
- speciation model do not consider carbonates nor calcium hydroxides complexes

Comparison with previous literature

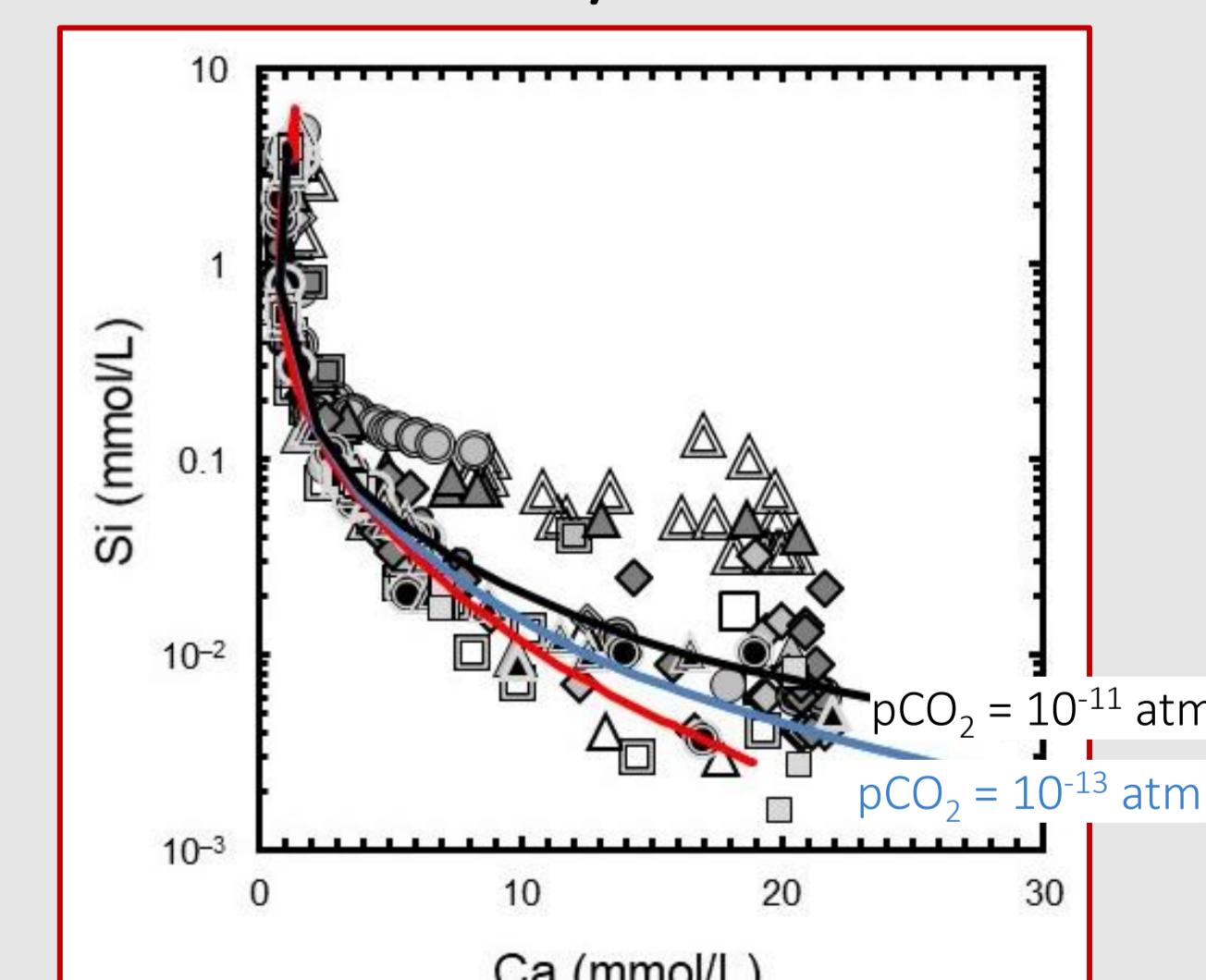


A limited carbonation allow reproducing Santschi and Schindler [1] results without considering Ca-Si complexation

Nicoleau and Schindler [2]

- Ca^{2+} ISE + pH measurements
 - Titration by Na_2SiO_3
 - $[\text{Ca}]$: 1 to 7 mM
 $[\text{Cl}]$: 2 to 14 mM
 $[\text{Na}]$: 1 to 100 mM
 $[\text{Si}]$: 0.2 to 1.3 mM
 - In $\text{N}_2(g)$ atmosphere
- Calculated Ca^{2+} activity without Ca-Si complexes
 $R^2 = 0.996724$
- Including $\text{CaSiO}_2(\text{OH})_2$ improves R^2 by $1.36 \cdot 10^{-4}$
- Considering $\text{pCO}_2 = 10^{-11}$ atm improves R^2 similarly by $1.22 \cdot 10^{-4}$

Finally



Using Roosz et al. [4] model with $\text{pCO}_2 = 10^{-13}$ atm gives results similar to Nicoleau and Schindler [2]

Several analytical techniques are used to characterize the filtered solutions (Raman, 29Si NMR, High energy X-ray, acidic titrations, Ca-ISE, ICP). Measurements do not provide unambiguous proof of the presence of mixed calcium-silica complexes in the solutions. Rather, they indicate different sources of uncertainty in analytical methods (ICP) and Ca^{2+} ISE measurements, especially. Hex-rays results clearly indicate a partial carbonation of the system. Modelling the titration experiments confirms the carbonation of the system, especially for high pH solutions. Finally, previous works dedicated to calcium-silica complexes are re-investigated and re-assessed regarding for the influence of carbonation. The latter can explain modifications of the overall speciation without involving the presence of mixed silica complexes.
