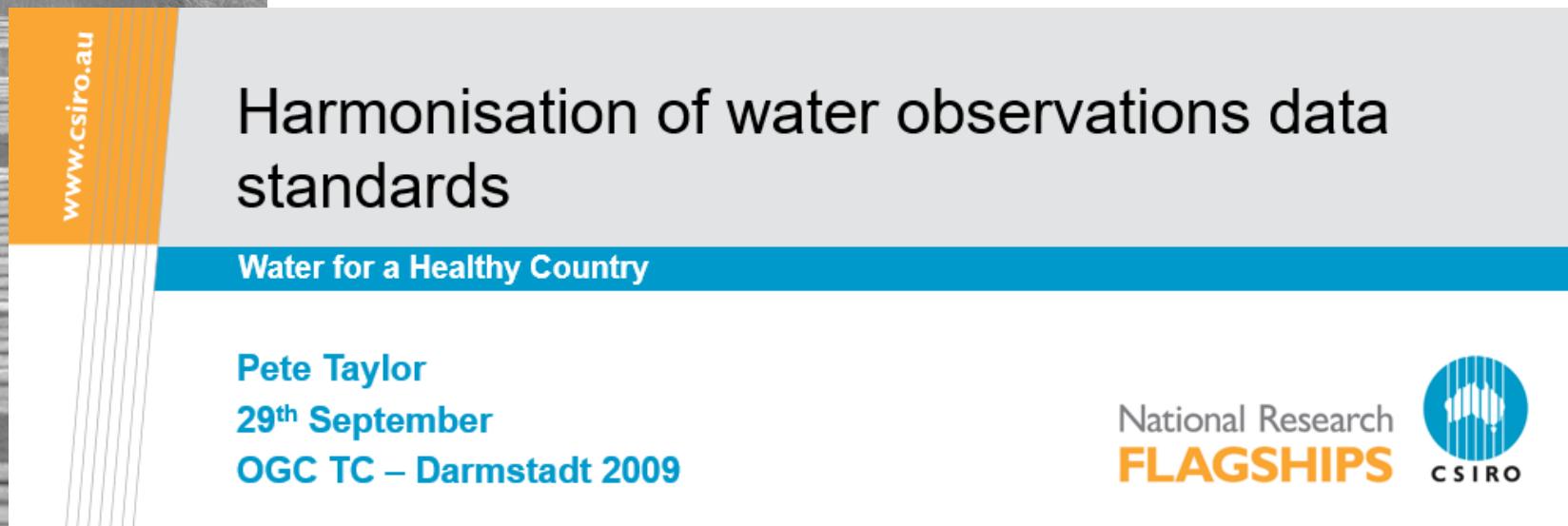

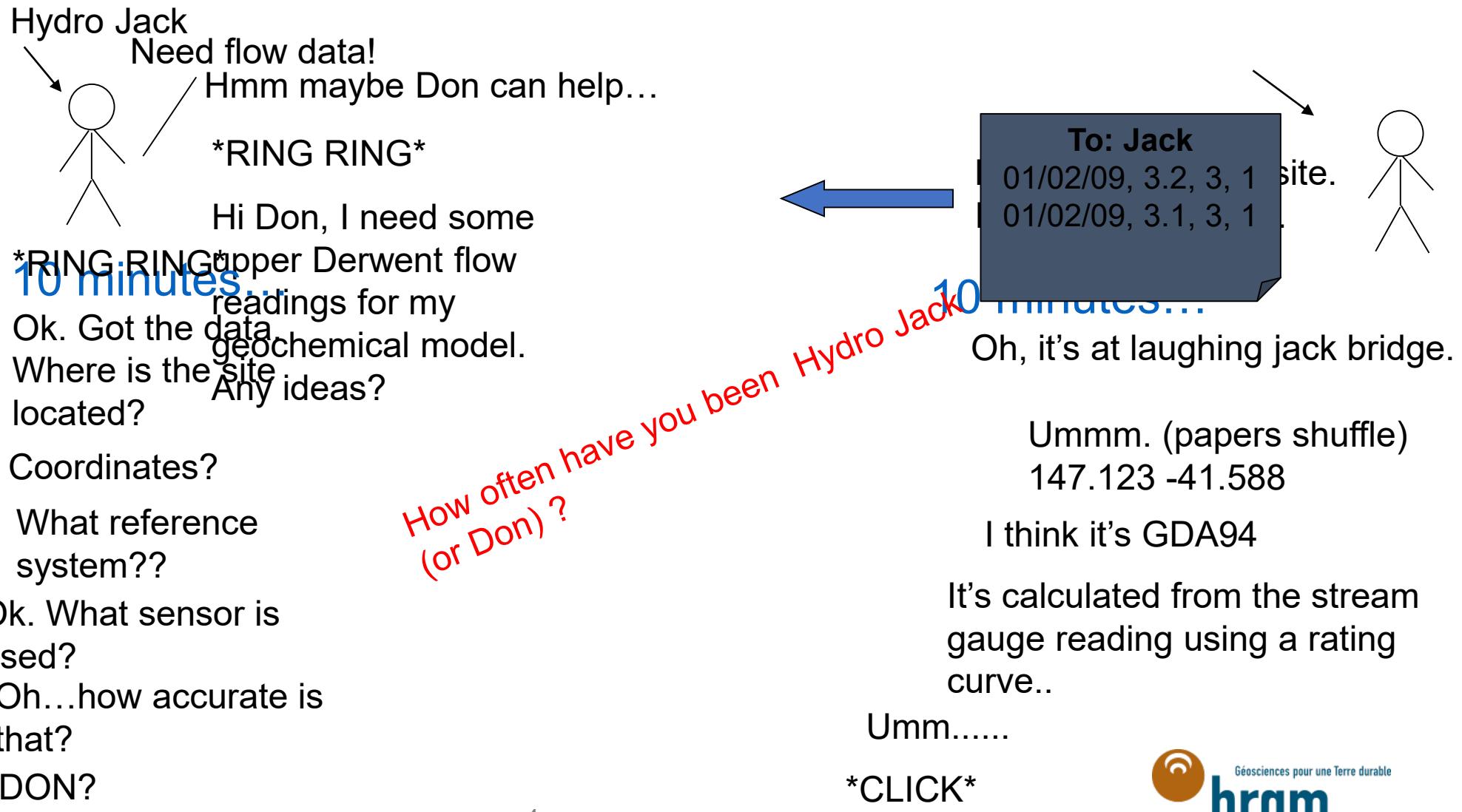
Why do we need interoperability -> hydrology example

The need for standards

- Sharing of hydrological data is somewhat ad-hoc, based largely on CSV files and FTP
- Leads to very inefficient (or non-existent) transfer and sharing of data
- Sharing requires a lot of transformation effort on the behalf of the data requestor
 - Parse different file formats
 - Understand the concepts
 - Metadata is often limited or non-existent, requiring follow up conversations

20 years after publication, 80% of scientific data is lost

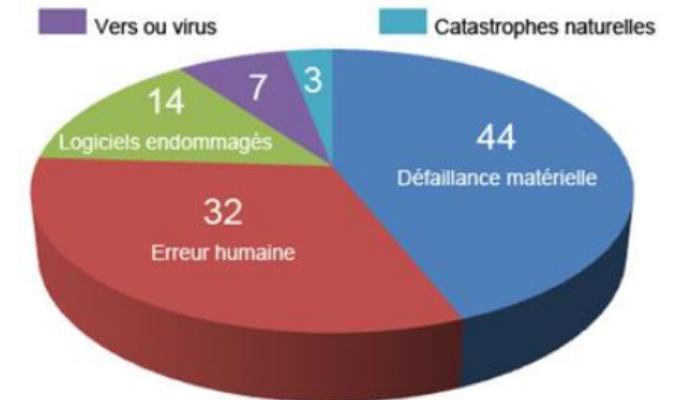
- Pour les auteurs

• **Causes :**

- Destruction des supports
- Problème de version, obsolescence matérielle ou logicielle
- Lieu de stockage indéfini

• **Conséquences :**

- Perte de temps, d'argent (fonds publics...)
- Pas de vérification des résultats possible
- Pas de comparaison des résultats dans le temps ou l'espace
- Pas de réutilisations (différentes)





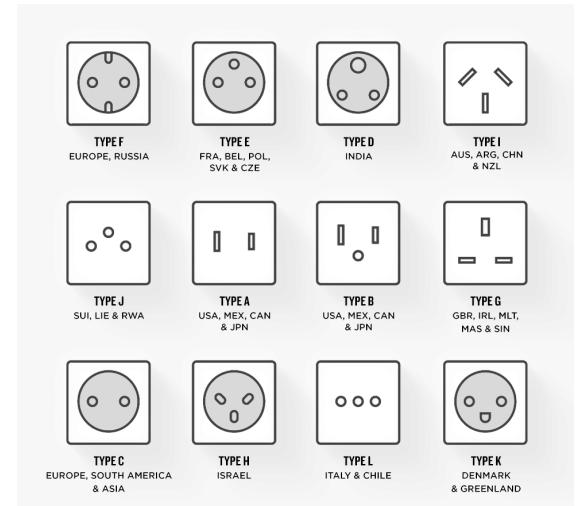
Why do we need interoperability

- Simple thing done everyday

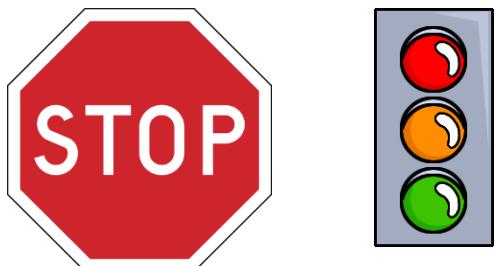


Simple because normalized, we can easily plug our kettle at home or at the office

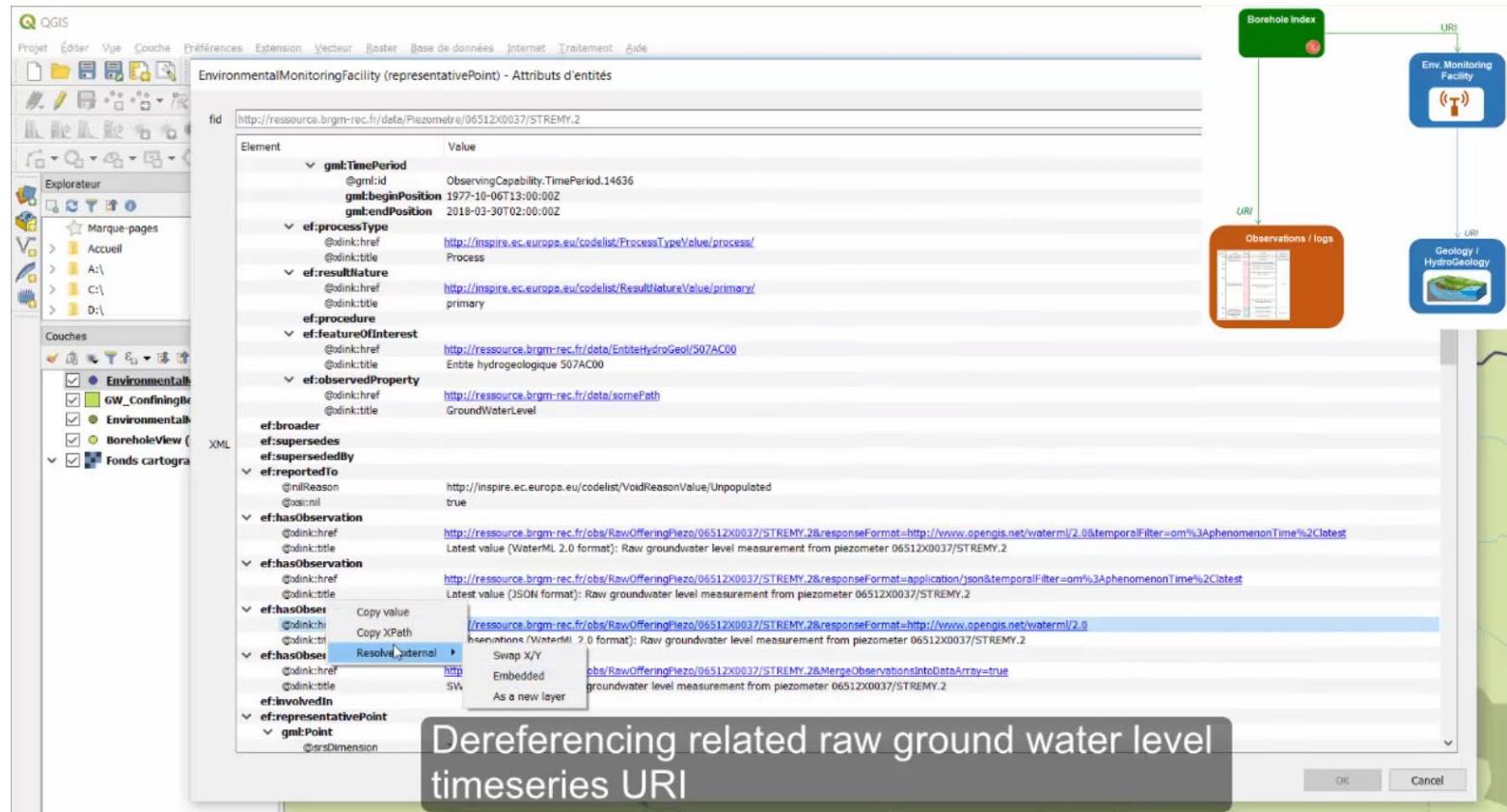

Interoperability

Benefits

- 2 folds aspects
 - Either we have legal constraints (Re INSPIRE and FAIR presentation)
 - But when no constraints exist, how to set up a Data Sharing culture?
- Creating the necessary organizational context to opening / sharing data is already quite an endeavor
 - So, when this point is reached, the technical aspects should be straightforward.



Interoperability

Context

- More and more external pressure on organisations
 - Climate change
 - Health crisis
 - Reduced (public) fundings

=> Organizations cannot afford to reinvent their own wheel locally when it comes down to sharing data

- Even more when we have 90% of the solutions at hand
 - Experience shows that it's not a matter of IT issues (those can always be fixed)
 - It's a matter of organizing communities & changing behaviours

=> Let's explore how to do so
